Introduction:

We study definition of tribes, there cultural identity and scenario. First is the definition of tribes. India has the largest tribal population in the world. About 8.5 crores tribals live over the long corridors of Western, Central and Eastern India. Not only this, India's tribal population constitutes over 8 per cent of Worlds total tribal population of 100 crores and the highest concentration of them are in the States like Jharkhand, Bihar, Carved out of Bihar in Orissa, Chhattisgarh, West Bengal, and Assam.

Meaning of tribes and their cultural identity:

Who are tribals? This is very important to determine because there will be easy to identify them. So a view of the tribe is developmentally or historically, as a social group existing before the development of, or outside, states. A tribe is a group of distinct people, dependent on their land for their livelihood, who are largely self-sufficient, and not integrated into the national society.

Stephen Corry defined tribal people as those who "...have followed ways of life for many generations that are largely self-sufficient, and are clearly different from the mainstream and dominant society." There is an estimated one hundred and fifty million tribal individuals worldwide constituting around forty percent of indigenous individuals. Although nearly all aribal people are indigenous, some are not indigenous to the areas where they now live.

After observing the definition of the tribe one point clearly to be noted that these tribes are different from the urban civil society or main stream in their cultural identity, means of production, sources of product, political culture, technology and understanding. So there one thing should remember the cultural identity. The definition of cultural identity is as following.

Cultural identity is the identity or feeling of belonging to a group. It is part of a person's self-conception and self-perception and is related to nationality, ethnicity, religion, social class, generation, locality or any kind of social group that has its own distinct culture. In this way, cultural identity is both characteristic of the individual but also of the culturally identical group of members sharing the same cultural identity.²

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customary rights of the tribals over resources were to be given. The benefits of large scale of industries and infrastructure, did not reach these tribals. This has contributed to rise of the Naxalite movements as before said. The above policies have also led to the environmental damage and imbalance. This is the social side effects of the development in tribal areas. Earlier, Tribals bring hindrance to development.

Their traditional socio-economic and cultural systems did not fully approved to the general perspectives on development. In the present scenario India where the mining and industrialization in tribal areas is linked with retarded economic performance. Naxalites have hindered both private companies and government institutions. Now tribes have a understanding that democratic way is the best alternative for coming main stream of development.

Forest rights act (2006), any corresponding law for mineral and rights over other kind of resources yet to be formulated. They see it as a "Land Redistribution Exercise". It will be provided a legal right for the communities themselves to protect the forest. The law concerns the rights of forest dwelling communities to land and other resources, denied to them over decades as a result of the continuance of colonial forest laws in India. 'Tribal peoples across India are being illegally evicted from their ancestral homelands in the name of tiger conservation. They're promised alternative land, housing, and money, but these are lies: they often receive little or nothing, and end up living in abject squalor on the edge of their territorys

There are 46 recognized Scheduled Tribes in Madhya Pradesh, India, three of which have been identified as 'Particularly Vulnerable Tribal Groups' (PTGs) (formerly known as "Special Primitive Tribal Groups"). The population of Scheduled Tribals (ST) is 21.1% of the state population (15.31 million out of 72.62 million), according to the 2011 census.⁵

The Wikipedia has seen the diversity in the tribes across the state-Madhya Pradesh comes from differences in heredity, lifestyle, cultural traditions, social structure, economic structure, religious beliefs and language and speech. Due to the different linguistic, cultural and geographical environments, the diverse tribal world of Madhya Pradesh has been largely cut off from the mainstream of development, 'Face to face contact is the useful method to social change is seen. People do not accept idea immediately as they listen, it takes time. The problem of communication in under developed tribal areas is that of adopting the agents of change, the media of communication and forms and content of communication to the culture, value system, attitudes and overall view of the community. The degree of success will depend upon the workers ability to recognize the exiting channels of communication, to anticipate the culture direct responses of the people and to adopt the method of communication."
